About This Summary

This summary has been prepared by the Birch Carbon Program to help Indigenous Nations better understand the practical steps involved in developing and implementing a greenhouse gas offset project.

Rather than replacing the original Government of Canada publication, this document highlights the major stages of project development, explains why each step matters, and connects them to the opportunities available through Indigenous-led environmental stewardship.

THE STARTING POINT

Why This Matters

Carbon credits are only created after a project has been carefully designed, independently verified, and registered under an approved carbon standard.

For Indigenous Nations, understanding the project development process helps ensure communities make informed decisions, protect their interests, and maximize the long-term value of their lands and natural assets.

THE POINT OF THIS SUMMARY

Every successful carbon project begins long before credits are ever issued.

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KEY CONCEPTS EXPLAINED



STAGES 01 AND 02

Choosing a System, and Planning the Work

1 Selecting the Right Carbon System

Every project begins by choosing the appropriate carbon program and methodology. Different systems have different rules, standards, eligible project types, and buyers.

Choosing the right standard from the beginning helps position a project for long-term success and future credit sales.

2 Planning the Project

Planning defines how carbon will be measured, protected, and monitored. It sets project boundaries, identifies eligible lands, gathers baseline information, and prepares the documentation registration requires.

Strong planning creates a solid foundation for the entire project and helps reduce future risks.

STAGES 03 AND 04

Proving It, and Putting It on the Record

3 Independent Validation

Some carbon programs require an independent expert to review the project before registration, confirming it has been properly designed and follows the approved methodology.

Independent validation builds confidence for investors, buyers, and registries while improving project credibility.

4 Registering the Project

Before credits can be generated, the project must be formally registered with an approved offset system. Registration covers project ownership, legal rights, design, carbon accounting methods, and expected reductions.

Registration establishes the project within the carbon market and protects the community's ownership of future carbon benefits.

STAGES 05 AND 06

Measuring the Carbon, Protecting It

5

Measuring Carbon

Every project must identify where carbon is stored, removed, or released, evaluating **carbon sources, sinks, and reservoirs**. These measurements are the scientific basis for calculating credits.

Accurate measurement ensures credits represent real environmental outcomes.

6

Additionality and Risk Management

Projects must show the carbon benefits would not have happened without the project, and must identify and manage long-term risks such as wildfire or insect outbreaks that could affect stored carbon.

Long-term stewardship helps protect both environmental integrity and future community revenue.

STAGES 07 AND 08

Doing the Work, and Proving It Again

7 Implementation and Monitoring

Once registered, the project moves into active implementation. Communities monitor activities, collect data, maintain records, and continually measure reductions according to approved methodologies.

Monitoring demonstrates that environmental benefits continue throughout the life of the project.

8 Verification and Credit Issuance

Independent third-party verification confirms the project has achieved the reductions it claims. Once verified, carbon credits may be issued by the registry.

Verification turns measured stewardship into recognized credits that can enter the marketplace.

STAGE 09

Selling Carbon Credits

After credits are issued, they may be sold to qualified buyers through:

- Brokers

- Wholesalers

- Direct agreements

- Organized carbon markets

Understanding potential buyers early in the project helps maximize long-term project value.

WHY IT MATTERS TO INDIGENOUS NATIONS

Successful carbon projects combine environmental stewardship with long-term economic opportunities for future generations.

OUR PERSPECTIVE

This is about far more than generating carbon credits.

It is about building a long-term environmental asset that recognizes Indigenous stewardship while creating new economic opportunities.

Every stage, from planning and validation through to monitoring and verification, helps ensure projects deliver measurable climate benefits while respecting Indigenous leadership, community priorities, and responsible land management.

ALWAYS IN A GOOD WAY

The process can look complex from the outside. Taken one stage at a time, with the right partners, it is a path a community can walk.

OUR ROLE

How the Birch Carbon Program Supports Communities

We work alongside Indigenous Nations at every stage of project development by:

- Identifying eligible carbon opportunities
- Coordinating technical and scientific assessments
- Supporting project planning and documentation
- Managing validation and verification requirements
- Assisting with project registration and monitoring
- Connecting verified credits with qualified buyers

OUR GOAL

To simplify a highly technical process while ensuring Indigenous Nations remain the decision-makers and the beneficiaries of their own environmental stewardship.

NEXT STEPS

Where a Nation Can Begin

Nine stages is the whole journey. No Nation starts at stage nine, and there is no obligation at any stage.

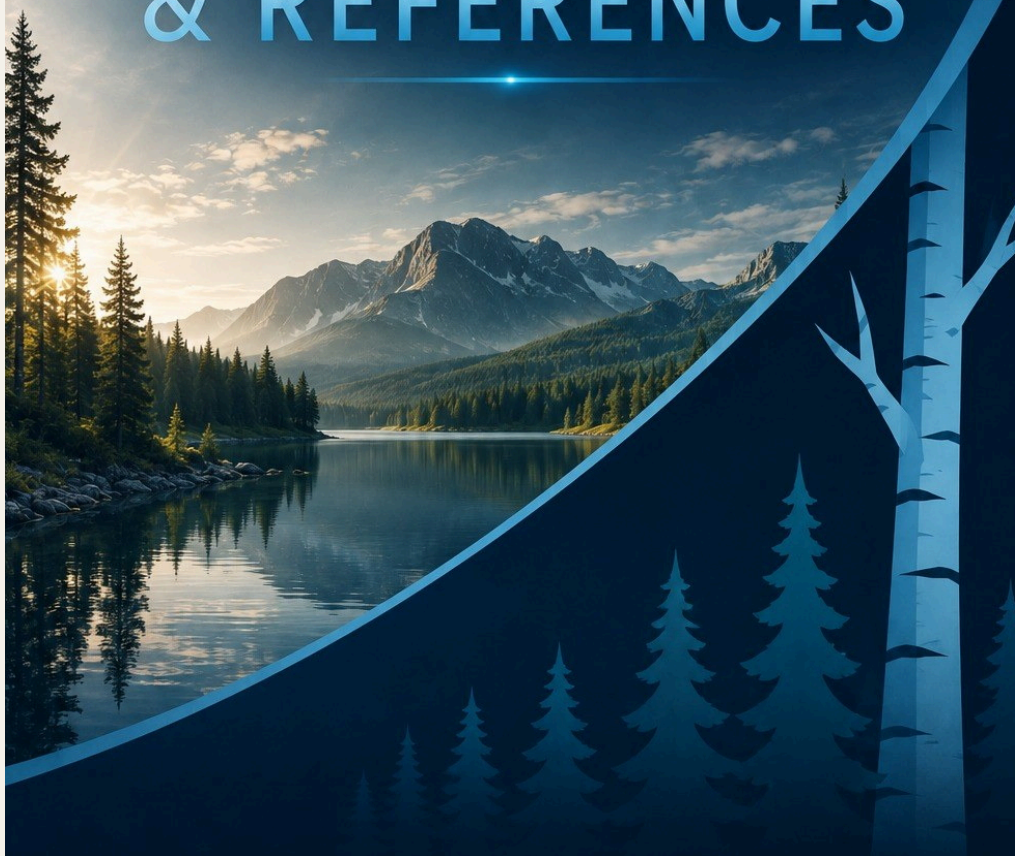
- **Start before stage one.** A conversation costs nothing and commits nothing.
- **Talk it through.** We can meet with Chief and Council, staff, or community members and answer questions in plain language.
- **Look at the land.** A preliminary review helps identify whether territory may support an eligible project type.
- **Decide together.** Any next step is the Nation's decision, on the Nation's timeline.
